



PROF. DR. CARLOS ESCUDÉ

Carlos Escudé was born in 1948 in Buenos Aires, where he studied sociology as an undergraduate degree. In Michaelmas '77 he was matriculated at Oxford University as a doctoral student of St. Antony's College, and in 1978 he was awarded a Fulbright-Hays Fellowship for use at Yale University, to which he transferred. Yale awarded him a Ph.D. in Political Science in 1981.

In 1984 he was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship, and as such returned to Oxford as a Visiting Fellow of St. Antony's. Among other academic appointments outside Argentina, he has been Visiting Professor at Harvard University (1994) and at Madrid's Instituto Ortega y Gasset (1997), as well as Visiting Scholar at Universität Augsburg (1996), the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (1992), the School of Advanced International Studies of The Johns Hopkins University (1990), and the University of Texas at Austin (1989).

In 1986 he was decorated with the Order of Bernardo O'Higgins for his public campaign for peace between Argentina and Chile, endangered until 1984 because of the Beagle Channel dispute. He has also received awards from the Argentine Council of Scientific Research (CONICET, 1987), the Konex Foundation (1996) and *Fundación El Libro* (2001). In 2003 he was appointed Trent University's 2003-2004 Ashley Fellow (Canada).

In the early 1990s he was advisor on issues of Argentine foreign policy strategy to former Foreign Minister Guido Di Tella. From 1994 to 2000 he was consultant to Argentine-sponsored United Nations Development Program (UNDP) projects, editing a 15-volume work on the history of Argentine foreign relations, jointly with then Deputy Foreign Minister Andrés Cisneros.

He is the author of eighteen books, published mainly in Argentina but also in the United States and Italy. Seventeen of these are academic and one is a novel. His academic articles have been published also in the United Kingdom, Germany, Israel, Spain, Poland, Russia, Mexico, Brazil and Chile. His latest work in English is "Israel, Latin America and the United States: A Peripheral-Realist Perspective", presented as keynote address at the opening session of the Latin American section (AMILAT) of the 15th World Congress of Jewish Studies, delivered at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem on 2 August 2009.

He is currently Professor of International Relations at Universidad del CEMA (Buenos Aires), director of its *Centro de Estudios Internacionales y de Educación para la Globalización* (CEIEG), and Senior Tenured Researcher (*Investigador Principal*) at the Argentine Council of Scientific Research (CONICET).
